#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course will cover critical concepts and ideas of the study of child and adolescent social development. It will focus on changes in interpersonal relationships, emotions, achievement-related behavior and competence, and functioning within the broader social context.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- Master understanding of the major theories of social development
- Master understanding of the various sources of influence (e.g., social, cultural, environmental, etc.) on social development
- Master understanding of methods and current findings of developmental research on social development

### COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

### - ATTENDANCE (100 points)

O I expect you to attend and be engaged. There will be short in class exercises that will be handed in at the end of the class session. These exercises will randomly occur 10 times over the course of the semester, and the format of these exercises will vary. Each exercise will count for 10 points on your final attendance grade (100 points total), and can only be taken in person. Make-ups will not be allowed.

# - **GROUP PROJECTS (200 points)**

- Study Guides (100 points)
  - Students will be split up into groups of 4 and will be assigned to create study guide materials for a given topic. The purpose of this assignment is to become

experts on a given sub topic, and create materials for the class that can be used to study for exams. Study guides will be presented during the class on the assigned date. More details to follow.

### Final Presentations (100 points)

 Connecting Empirical Work to Study Guide Topic. On the last two days of class students will present how an empirical paper connects to their study guide topic. More details to follow.

### - WRITING POSTS (300 points)

There will be two individual writing assignments throughout the semester worth 150 points each. These assignments will be short answer responses to several questions relating to the corresponding exam material. More details will follow.

## - EXAMS (400 points)

O There will be two exams and one cumulative final. The first two exams will be worth 150 points each and the cumulative final will be worth 100 points. Exams will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions. Exams are a major scheduled grading events and thus absences will be dealt with according to major scheduled event guidelines (see below).

#### - GRADING

O Below is the grading breakdown. Once I have calculated a final score (out of 1,000 points), I will calculate an overall percentage, round up to the next whole number, and assign letter grades. For example, 90-92% will be an A-; 93-96% will be an A, and 97-100% will be an A+.

Attendance: Regular attendance is critical. Lectures will cover the bulk of the course material. Reading lecture slides is only a partial substitute for attendance – they will often be terse and difficult to interpret without having listened to the actual lecture. While your attendance is not directly graded, please remember that quizzes will occur at the end of many class meetings, and you won't be able to take the quiz unless you stay for the duration of the time.

**Missed single class due to illness**: Once during a semester, a student's self-authored note will be accepted as an excuse for missing a minor scheduled grading event in a single class session if the note documents the date of the illness, acknowledgement from the student that information provided in the note is correct, and a statement that the student understands that providing false information is a violation of the Code of Student Conduct. You must provide me with this documentation within *one week of the absence or during the next class period that you are able to attend* (whichever comes first). Students are expected to make every attempt to inform the instructor of the illness prior to the date of the missed class.

Major scheduled grading events: Major scheduled grading events are indicated on the syllabus with an asterisk \*. The conditions for accepting a self-signed note do not apply to these events. Written, signed documentation by a health care professional or other professional in the case of non-medical reasons (see below) of a University-approved excuse for the student's absence must be supplied. You must provide me with documentation within one week of the absence or during the next class period that you are able to attend (whichever comes first). You may not make up major graded events due to being absent unless you provide written documentation that excuses your absence. You are also expected to make every attempt to notify me prior to class. In the case of medical absence, this documentation must include verification of treatment dates and the time period for which the student was unable to meet course requirements. Providers should not include diagnostic information. Note: Planned personal travel is not a university approved excuse for missing a major grading events.

Non-consecutive medically necessitated absences from multiple class sessions: Students who throughout the semester miss multiple, non-consecutive class sessions due to medical problems must provide written documentation from a health care professional that their attendance on those days was prohibited for medical reasons. This documentation must include verification of treatment dates and the time period for which the student was unable to meet course requirements. Without this documentation, opportunities to make up missed assignments or assessments will not be provided.

**Non-medical excused absences**: According to University policy, non-medical excused absences for missed assignments or assessments may include illness of a dependent, religious observance, involvement in University activities at the request of University officials, or circumstances that are beyond the control of the student. Students asking for excused absence for any of those reasons must also supply appropriate written documentation of the cause and make every attempt to inform the instructor prior to the date of the missed class. If you already know of dates that you will need to be excused, please let me know during the first week of classes or as soon as possible.
