First Annual Distinguished Lecturer Series Kicks Off with October 28 Talk by Professor Nancy K. Schlossberg, Professor Emeritus



As adults reach different stages in their lives, they are faced with an array of challenges and transitions which can often lead to feelings of being overwhelmed and confused.

Nancy K. Schlossberg, Ed.D., an expert in the areas of adult transitions, career development, adults as learners, and intergenerational relationships, will address these challenges and discuss managing change at

Nancy K. Schlossberg discuss managing change at the October 28 inaugural presentation of the First Annual Distinguished Lecturer Series by the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services

The lecture, titled: *Transitions—Challenges and Bridges through Life*, begins at 3 p.m. at the University of Maryland Golf Course Clubhouse. It will be followed by a 4 p.m. reception and booksigning. The Schlossberg presentation kicks off a new annual lecture series being launched by the department to highlight distinguished scholars and practitioners from the counseling and psychology fields.

"It is an honor to present Dr. Schlossberg as the inaugural speaker in our new Distinguished Lecturer Series," said Dennis Kivlighan, Jr., chair of the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services. "Her noteworthy career at the university as well as her scholarship is a credit to the department, our college and the University of Maryland. We are looking forward to welcoming her back to the campus."

Schlossberg's lecture will draw from her most recent book, *Retire Smart, Retire Happy: Finding Your True Path.* She will share insights from her life's work on how career upheavals, changes in marital status, children leaving home, or other life challenges can create uncertainty and anxiety as they are often unexpected or outside of one's control. According to Schlossberg, there are ways to respond to changes that can help individuals gain confidence, ease the transition, and even thrive while navigating life's challenges.

Schlossberg is professor emeritus from the College of Education and a University of Maryland Distinguished Scholar. The author of several books, she is also the president of a consulting group, TransitionWorks. Before coming to the university, she served on the faculties of Wayne State University, Howard University, and the Pratt Institute. She was the first woman executive at the American Council of Education (ACE), where she established the Office of Women in Higher Education in 1973. She has appeared on PBS' *In the Prime*, Derek McGinty's national talk radio show, Fox News, CNN *Sonia Live*, CBS *Evening News*, CBS *This Morning*, the NBC *Knowledge Series*, and two PBS/College Board live video-conferences.

She also served in leadership positions in academic and civic organizations, and is the recipient of several awards, including the Walter Storey Career Development Professional Award of the American Society for Training and Development, and has been honored by the National Career Development Associate, the National Associate of Student Personnel Administrators and the American College Personnel Association. A Message from the Dean:



Edna Mora Szymanski

At this writing, I am now into my sixth year as dean. We are ranked 20th in the nation, with nine programs in the top 20 and five programs in the top 10.

Sounds like a numbers game, doesn't it? But it's not. The College of Education is far more than statistics, rankings, enrollment and programs. We are a complex and vibrant institution, part of a highly regarded research university, and

are on the brink of greatness.

That message was defily articulated during a VIP Briefing we hosted at the college in June. As part of our continuing efforts to strengthen our reach and influence with stakeholders, we assembled some of our top faculty to present highlights from their on-going research. Members of your alumni board attended with other VIPs.

Following a "tapas" format, we offered samplings across several disciplines and assembled a comprehensive briefing book with one-page summaries of our teacher preparation and graduate degree programs, highlights of the work of our centers and institutes, and abstracts of our top-funded research projects.

The chair of our Board of Visitors, Raymond "Buzz" Bartlett, joined with William "Bud" Thomas to weave the presentations, lunch program, and discussion into a cohesive overview of our college. Thomas, vice president of student affairs emeritus of the university, closed the briefing with insightful commentary that I have chosen to share in my column here.

"We have heard impressive examples of the excellent scholarship being done in the University of Maryland College of Education.

We have been impressed by the magnitude and the scope of the work being done and the successes that have accrued. We have heard of productive collaborations and involvement of the faculty and the college in multiple arenas and external agencies.

We have once again witnessed the exciting, enthusiastic, and contagious commitment of Dean Szymanski to pursue excellence without faltering...even under difficult circumstances.

Simply summarized, we have a better understanding of the work of the college...today will help to get us all on the same page. We are now better equipped to promote the mission and agenda of the college in the future. That said, serving for the past few years as a part-time consultant and occasional project facilitator for the dean, as well as a long-time observer of the college's fortunes, it is my observation that the College of Education, in this time in its long history, is alive and well...

- Or well enough to have survived periodic hardships when others did not.
- Well enough to have accomplished new and expanded missions and exciting new research, when others were content or forced to meet only minimal expectations.
- Well enough to have experienced more than a few moments of grand achievement and distinguished recognition, when others could only dream of such moments...
 - ...but occasional moments of greatness are not frequent enough, and 'well enough' is not good enough for a world class college!

Bear in mind that it is a widely accepted tenet of the quality assurance movement in world businesses that complex organizations are never static. If an organization is not improving... it is getting worse. If an organization is not growing, it is decaying.

Our College of Education has chosen not to settle for 'well enough.' It has chosen to improve and to grow.

But to gain and sustain excellence, the college needs active and generous support. It needs active champions in any arena, agency, or discussion where issues or priorities emerge that might help or hurt its mission.


It needs generous supporters who share with the college the timeless, yet still passionate belief that the advancement of education is a noble venture, as well as the stark realization that any society simply cannot long endure, let alone flourish, without maintaining a grand system of effective education.

The students, staff, faculty, and administration of the college are, as we have heard today in so many ways, all about 'effective education' in our society. The college is a central player in society's duty to educate itself effectively.

The college has been good at its work. The college has gotten, over the past several years, considerably better at its work. The college strives to be permanently among the very best.

That can only happen if each of us, and those we can recruit, are active as champions, and generous as supporters."

College Moves up in *U.S. News* Rankings to 20th in Nation



Rankings released this spring by U.S. News & World Report showed the University of Maryland College of Education moved up to rank 20th in the nation, with the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services retaining its number one ranking for the fifth consecutive year.

"Over the past years, our college ranking has steadily increased," said

Edna Mora Szymanski, Dean of the College of Education. "This is a strong reflection of the quality and productivity of our excellent faculty, staff, and students."

This year's edition of the "Best Graduate Schools" by *U.S. News* ranked the college within the top 20 in eight out of 10 education specialties, as well as one allied health specialty (rehabilitation counseling, last ranked in 2003). Of these nine top 20 rankings, five programs are ranked within the top 10 in the nation. The college has more top-20 ranked programs than any other college on campus.

The rankings for 2005:

- Administration and Supervision (17)
- Counseling and Personnel Services department (1)
- Curriculum and Instruction department (11)
- Educational Policy (13)
- Educational Psychology (9)
- Elementary Education (17)
- Higher Education Administration (10)
- Rehabilitation Counseling program (9)
 (Note: Ranked in 2003 in the Allied Health category)
- Special Education department (7)

"No other college of education in the greater Baltimore-Washington area is ranked in the top 20," said Szymanski, who is beginning her sixth year as dean of the college. "Our alumni have much of which to be proud."

Dean Szymanski also noted that in comparison, the College of Education has more top-20 ranked education specialties than all but one of the University's stated peers (University of California-Los Angeles, University of California-Berkeley, University of Michigan, University of Illinois or University of North Carolina) and that is University of Illinois.

Two College Faculty Recognized with Regents' Awards

Two College of Education professors were honored in April with University System of Maryland Regents' Faculty Awards for 2004. This award is the highest honor the Board of Regents bestows to recognize exemplary faculty achievement.

Peter E. Leone, Ph.D., Department of Special Education, was recognized for Excellence in Public Service. John T. Guthrie, Ph.D., of the Department of Human Development was selected for his Scholarship/Research/Creative Activities.

Leone specializes in behavior disorders with service to troubled youth, as well as field-based research that examines the multi-dimensional problems associated with behavior disorders. His research interests focus on program environments for troubled youth, educational entitlements of incarcerated youth, and policy studies. Leone is the director of the National Center on Education, Disability, and Juvenile Justice (EDJJ)—a research, training and technical assistance project funded with a multi-year \$3 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education and the U.S. Department of Justice.

Guthrie is director of the Maryland Literacy Research Center at the University of Maryland. His research interests are literacy development and environments for learning. Guthrie is currently directing a large-scale literacy research project in Frederick County Public Schools titled, "Increasing Reading Comprehension, Motivation, and Science Knowledge through Concept-Orient Reading Instruction (CORI) in a District-wide Experiment." The project is funded through a \$4.1 million grant from the National Science Foundation.

The Board of Regents established the faculty awards in 1995 to publicly recognize distinguished performance by educators and researchers within the university system. Each year up to 15 awards are presented in five categories: scholarship/research/creative activities, collaboration, mentoring, public service, and teaching. Each awardee receives \$1,000 and a plaque of recognition.

Two-day Symposium on Minority Achievement Features Presentation by Alumnus William Tate

A two-day research symposium hosted by the Maryland Institute for Minority Achievement and Urban Education, with funding from the National Science Foundation, focused on



mathematics achievement for minority learners.
"Optimizing Mathematical Achievement for All Students" was the theme for the symposium, which was held September 23-24 at the University Inn and Conference Center..

The four keynote

ways of optimizing

speakers for the symposium program were Patricia F. Campbell, University of Maryland; Ronald F. Ferguson, Harvard University; Danny B. Martin, University of Illinois; and William Tate, Washington University in St. Louis. Tate is an alumnus of the College of Education, and was the recipient of the Outstanding Scholar Award from the College of Education Alumni Chapter in 2000.

The goal of the event was to "stimulate and encourage a new group of researchers to take a direct and active role in finding solutions to the problems of underachievement," said Martin L. Johnson, associate dean for Urban and Minority Education and director of the institute. "Underachievement continues to be well identified within the minority student population."


Nearly 100 graduate students and their professors from across the nation attended the event, which will be held again next year, Johnson said, thanks to a second-year grant from the National Science Foundation. Next year's theme will focus on optimizing minority achievement in science.

Summaries of research from each speaker's area of expertise were presented with topics that represent different aspects and

complexities of urban schooling. Among the areas examined were teachers and teaching, curriculum and curriculum reform, classroom culture, and student expectations.

Participants formed working groups to explore current research to identify factors impacting mathematics achievement of minority students; identify the research needed to inform policy-makers, practitioners, and curriculum developers; and develop a research agenda.

Faculty Member Barbara Finkelstein Honored with Award from Japan's Emperor

Ambassador Ryozo Kato presented the prestigious award to Finkelstein in honor of her efforts to foster cultural exchange between Japan and the United States. The award, conferred by Japan's Emperor Heisei, recognizes Japanese and foreign nationals for their outstanding contributions to promoting knowledge of Japanese culture throughout the world.

The Order of the Rising Sun (Kyuokujitsusho) was the first order established in Japan. The custom of often awarding foreigners for their services to Japan began in 1981. Finkelstein is among a handful of women to be honored with the award. She was recognized for her work with hundreds of educators over the past 20 years, which contributed to mutual understanding between Japan and the United States in the classrooms of both nations.

Finkelstein is a professor in the Department of Education Policy and Leadership, and is director of the International Center for Transcultural Education's MidAtlantic Region Japan in the Schools (MARJiS) Program.

She earned her Ed.D. from Columbia University, Teachers College. Her research interests are crosscultural education policy, history of education, and history of childhood, youth and family values.

Memorial Service Planned for October 17 to Honor College Administrator Charles J. Beatty

harles J. Beatty, 70, a University of Maryland educator for 33 years who won master teacher and distinguished teaching awards, died of brain cancer September 9 at Casey House in Rockville.

A memorial service for Beatty is planned for 3 p.m. October 17 at the University of Maryland Chapel. A reception will follow at the Rossborough Inn. In lieu of flowers, the family has established

a scholarship fund in honor of Dr. Beatty. Proceeds from the fund will be used to support scholarships for transfer students from Montgomery College who want to attend the University of Maryland College of Education.

He retired in 1999 as associate dean for student affairs in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction, and after retirement continued to coordinate the College of Education graduation from the office of the dean.

"Those of us who were privileged to work with Chuck will miss his warmth, charm and sincerity," said Dean Edna Mora Szymanski. "His passing was a great shock to us all. His contribution to the life and spirit of the college will never be forgotten."

Beatty was born in Iron Mountain, Michigan. He earned his bachelor's degree from Northern Michigan University in 1959, a master's degree in education from Michigan State University in 1963, and a doctoral degree in education from the Ohio State University in 1967. He was married for nearly 38 years to a College of Education alumnus, Mary Ann Miller Beatty.

He joined the University of Maryland's Department of Industrial, Technological and Occupational Education in the College of Education as a professor and acting chairman in 1966. He remained with the college for his entire career. In addition to fulfilling the usual academic obligations of faculty committees, research grants, and scholarly articles, Beatty was active in professional organizations, including Phi Delta Kappa. He was given a special National Humanitarian Award from the International Technology Education Association. The Beattys were presented with the 2004 Distinguished Service to the College of Education award this past September.

He also served as chairman of the Tootsie Roll Drive for the Knights of Columbus for many years, and also worked with the Burtonsville Health Fair, Christmas in April, Boy Scouts, and Prince George's County Committee for Employment of People with Disabilities. He was a eucharistic minister at St. Joseph Catholic Church in Beltsville, Church of the Resurrection in Burtonsville and St. Alphonsus Rodriguez Catholic Church in Woodstock.

He delighted in sharing stories about his upbringing in Michigan, and was known for his skills with building projects, especially as a woodworker. He enjoyed playing golf and traveling with his wife.

Survivors include his wife of 38 years, Dr. Mary Ann Beatty of Ellicott City; three children, Dr. Charles Beatty of Tampa, Colleen Dooley of Denver, and Clare Dooley of Billings, Mont.; a sister; a brother; and a granddaughter. Editor's note: Contributions to the scholarship fund can be sent to:
