The two were honored during the 22nd Annual Faculty and Staff Convocation held Sept. 21 in the Memorial Chapel.

The Distinguished Scholar-Teacher Award recognizes senior faculty for outstanding scholarly accomplishment combined with excellence in teaching. The award carries an honorarium of \$5,000 to support the Distinguished Scholar-Teacher's professional activities. Awardees participate in programs for faculty or students to share their expertise in establishing productive research programs and developing successful teaching methods and approaches. In addition, recipients of the award present a lecture during the university's Distinguished Scholar-Teacher Lecture Series. women in society into the study of education. Fox's studies have been continuously funded for the past 19 years by the National Institutes of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD). He was also granted a MERIT award from the National Institutes of Health for his work on infant temperament. He currently receives funding as well from the National Institute of Mental Health for research on temperament and psychopathology, and for a study examining the effects of childhood onset depression on adults and their offspring.

A Message (rom the Dean:



One of the pleasures of working in education is the rhythm and pace of academic work: the excitement of a new year, meeting and greeting new and returning students, and planning for the busy months ahead. As I enter my seventh year as Dean of the College of Education, I continue to be exceptionally proud of our outstanding faculty and impressed by the quality and caliber of our

entering undergraduate and graduate students.

This year, I have additional reason for optimism. The university is planning to launch a major endowment and capital campaign next year. The exceptionally high quality of our programs, faculty, and students, coupled with the commitment of our alumni and friends, set the foundation for our strong participation in the campaign. To facilitate your involvement, I will use my column in this and future issues of *Endeavors* to talk about the college's aspirations and fundraising priorities and how our alumni and friends can assist us.

The University of Maryland is now in the "silent" phase of its fundraising campaign. During this time, each of the colleges will refine their campaign objectives to align with those of the campus campaign. We also identify leaders who will help us make the case for supporting the college and solicit leadership gifts—large pledges or gifts made in the early months of a campaign. Leadership gifts are very important to the college and university because they build momentum, inspire others to make gifts, and help meet the actual campaign goal.

Our first leadership gift of \$100,000 was from Jean Mullan, '68, president of the College of Education Alumni Chapter Board of Directors. Jean's generous gift was designated to the Investment in Excellence Fund, which has been established to accept gifts to initiate construction of an addition on the Benjamin Building, the current home of the College of Education. Until such time that ground can be broken, proceeds from gifts to the fund will be dedicated to provide scholarship support to College of Education students.

We are seeking additional leadership gifts like this one as they fulfill our two major goals for the upcoming campaign: support for faculty, especially through endowed chairs, and an addition to the Benjamin Building. We are also seeking support for scholarships, fellowships, and departmental and college institutes and centers. The goals are consistent with the university's campaign objectives as well.

Private support is absolutely critical at this time. Peer colleges across the nation use private gifts to support critical initiatives that promote quality and access. Most of our competitors have significant support for faculty through endowed professorships and chairs, strong scholarship and fellowship support, and state of the art facilities. Unfortunately, some of our competitors have used their advantages to lure away some of our talented scholars and students. With your help, I hope to put an end to that advantage.

Gifts to the college can be considered an investment and can create a legacy. Larger gifts can be made over a few years with the endowment named for the benefactor or used to honor a parent. For example, we can have endowed chairs, professorships, fellowships, scholarships, centers, and institutes. Parts of the proposed new building addition can also be named through a significant gift.

I invite you to be involved in our campaign planning by sharing your thoughts and suggestions. We are seeking alumni who are interested in helping with the campaign in a variety of capacities. For example, we would like leadership gifts that will inspire others to contribute. We would also like suggestions on events or publications that will inspire philanthropy from those who hold a stake in our success. College History Project Debuts this Fall with Web-based Timeline

Boxes of files and hundreds of photos.Video tapes and audio recordings. Sorting through decades of information is a challenging but required undertaking in order to capture and collect the history of the University of Maryland College of Education. With a written timeline in place and dozens of pages of photos and documents researched, assembled and copied, the college announces the debut of *Landmarks and Legacies: A History of the College of Education (1920-present)*. The history project is the college's major contribution to the University of Maryland's 150th Anniversary Celebration, which began this fall and continues through 2006.

The College of Education project is the brainchild of Dean Edna Mora Szymanski. Nearly two years ago, she shared her idea to undertake assembling a written history. College faculty, staff, retirees and alumni were enthusiastic about the project. "It is so important to collect and preserve the college's legacy," Szymanski said. "Examining our heritage and history is one way to see how the college has grown and changed, and to understand the many aspects of our past that have contributed to our tradition of excellence."

Szymanski charged a college committee to begin planning how to assemble the information. While one goal is to some day produce a printed publication, the committee decided to collect and assemble the information and present it through a Web site so the college and the community at large could have wide access to the contents.

The *Landmarks and Legacies* project will debut in November 2005 with its comprehensive, web-based timeline of College of Education events, featuring archival photos, historic firsts, research contributions, audio clips of oral history interviews, and significant milestones celebrating the college's role within the 150-year history of the University of Maryland.

The web-based history will include links to interviews with faculty retirees and former College of Education deans, photos from the University of Maryland archives that depict former faculty, the Center for Young Children and the origins of the Institute for Child Study, department histories, descriptions of the influence of student activities, and other accounts of the significant events in the college's history that were shaped by larger national historical events and contributed to the growth and expansion of programs.

The college's heritage and development were closely linked to historical events in the nations' history as well as national trends in education, including the Great Depression, World War II, and desegregation, among others. The college origins were as a teacher training program to train rural teachers in a predominantly agricultural state.

Over the decades, the college transformed from its primary focus on teacher training to a research-oriented institution known nationally and internationally. Initially, the college had very few defined departments and many loosely-joined areas of study. Efforts during the 1960s reorganized programs and led to the creation of the six departments in the 1970s.

The History Project Committee is co-chaired by Robert Hardy, a retired professor and former chair of the Department of Human Development, and Deborah Hudson, Assistant Dean for External Relations. Members include Jean R. Hebeler, retired professor in the Department of Special Education, and Charles H. Flatter, associate professor and former chair of the Department of Human Development. The late Chuck Beatty, retired College of Education administrator and college commencement coordinator who also taught in the college's former industrial technology program, was a member as well.

Primary research and archive collection has been led by Elizabeth Tobey, a new Ph.D. graduate in art history at the university, who joined the project last fall. Tobey has scoured hundreds of pages of files from University Archives and the college to assemble and organize the information.

Participants attended workshops led by the symposium's four keynote speakers: Okhee Lee-Salwen, University of Miami; Kenneth Tobin, The Graduate Center of City University of New York; Pamela Fraser-Abder, New York University; and Mary Atwater, University of Georgia. They examined and discussed in-depth the relationship of student achievement in science to cultural/community support, high quality teaching and teachers, instructional program coherence, and safety net interventions. The two-day event was held at the University of Maryland Inn and Conference Center. Last year's symposium on mathematical achievement attracted nearly 100 graduate students and professors from across the nation. College of Education Awards, Honors

Scheu Recipient of Hershenson Award

Hung-Bin Sheu is the first recipient of the David B. Hershenson Award for Outstanding Graduate Student Scholarship. The award was presented by the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services during a May 13 luncheon at the College of Education.

Sheu's winning paper was entitled, "Development and initial validation of the multicultural counseling self-efficacy scale—racial diversity form (MCSE-RD)." Sheu received a certificate of recognition and his name will be displayed on a department plaque. The Hershenson Award was initiated to encourage and recognize exemplary graduate student research that is theory-based or seeks to extend theory to novel counseling, psychological, or student development applications.

Hershenson was a faculty member in the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services from 1982 until his retirement in 2003. He was department chair from 1982 to 1990. Hershenson is a prolific scholar and highly regarded theoretician in the field of rehabilitation counseling.

Sinno Receives Clara Mayo Grant

Stefanie Sinno, a doctoral candidate in the Department of Human Development, is one of four recipients of a Clara Mayo Grant award from the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (SPSSI).

The \$500 award supports the recipient's master's thesis and pre-dissertation research on sexism, racism, or prejudice. Sinno was selected for her research project titled: "Children's evaluations of parental roles in the home and in the workforce." Sinno plans to incorporate theory from developmental and social psychology to examine the forms of reasoning children use in evaluating stereotypic and counter-stereotypic parental roles. Sinno's dissertation advisor is Professor Melanie Killen, Department of Human Development.

New Research Center Studies Assessment

The Center for Assessment of Higher Education (CAHE) is the latest addition to the innovative cadre of research centers housed under the College of Education. The impetus for the creation of the center was initiated by the Association of American Universities' (AAU) solicitation of proposals from member campuses to adopt ongoing research projects operating under the association's Assessing Quality of University Education and Research (AQUER) project. Namely, looking at the value added of undergraduate education, the measurement of faculty productivity, and an understanding of measurement and assessment of graduate education. After reviewing various submissions, the AAU accepted the comprehensive proposal from the College of Education at the University of Maryland.

The mission of the new center will be to develop and foster collaborative, interdisciplinary research focusing on assessment of the quality of education and research in university settings. It will also have a role in providing consultation services in other areas of assessment.

"I am really pleased that we were successful in acquiring this center, which further enhances our research mission," said Dean Edna Mora Szymanski. "The AAU's request for proposals triggered for us the recognition that the college and university offers an extensive array of resources and assets that can be brought to bear on from both a scholarly as well as an institutional perspective."

CAHE is co-directed by Chan M. Dayton, chair of the Department of Measurement, Statistics and Evaluation, and Dennis M. Kivlighan, Jr., chair of the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services. Tate previously served on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin-Madison and Texas Christian University where he was the William and Betty Adams Chair of Mathematics Education and Mathematics.
