As this year draws to a close, I am reminded of a Chinese proverb that seems a fitting metaphor for sharing news from your College of Education. "One generation plants the trees, and another gets the shade."

dean, I have been learning about the trees that we have and are planting. This includes our high quality academic programs and the depth and breadth of our faculty research. I am also getting acquainted with the longstanding relationships the college has with neighboring school districts and state agencies. Alumni share stories about their collegiate experiences, recall favorite faculty mentors, and explain how the College of Education prepared them for successful careers as educators, administrators or entrepreneurs.

These activities also contribute to my goal to increase active involvement in our efforts to raise private funds to support the goals that are part of the university's Great Expectations campaign. I was fortunate to experience the excitement and enthusiasm generated by the public launch of the university initiative on Oct. 20. "Great Expectations: The Campaign for Maryland" aims to raise a record \$1 billion in private support. As part of the university's overall fundraising campaign, Great Expectations, The Campaign for the College of Education expects to generate \$20 million in private support. Specifically, Great Expectations will focus on support to:

• Expand scholarships and assistantships for deserving undergraduate and graduate students. • Attract leading scholars through endowed chairs and professorships.

• Secure endowments for the Maryland Institute for Minority Achievement and Urban Education.

· Establish interdisciplinary research centers to help solve critical issues: child development, special education, school counseling, and mathematics, reading and science.

I am pleased to announce that your College of Education now has its first endowed faculty position. Alumnus and benefactor Jean Mullan '68, recognized that improving literacy in American schools is a complex and challenging issue, one that must be addressed through continued research on reading and motivation.

On Nov. 3, we recognized and celebrated the new Jean Mullan Professorship in Literacy at the University of Maryland, College of Education. The inaugural holder of the position is Professor John T. Guthrie of the Department of Human Development. The professorship is endowed in perpetuity thanks to Jean's generous leadership gift of \$500,000. As many alumni know, Jean served as President of the college's

The festive event was held under a large tent on the lawn of President C.D. Mote's home. Alumni celebrities, special guest Kermit the Frog, and students performers were among the entertainers for the gala event. "Great Expectations: The Campaign for Maryland" is a landmark effort to raise a record \$1 billion in private support, the largest goal ever pursued by a public institution in the state of Maryland and the Washington, D.C. area. The College of Education's goal for the campaign is \$20 million.

"As a part of our goal we plan to strengthen and reward our committed faculty by creating endowed positions within the College of Education," said Dennis M. Kivlighan, Jr., interim dean. "Endowed faculty positions help us to retain and attract scholars who are considered leaders in their field. The benefits of having such leaders on our faculty are numerous, but most importantly, our students receive the greatest benefit from direct engagement with top people in their field of interest."

The college's efforts are off to an outstanding start, according to Andrew Sheehy, executive director for development. "We are very fortunate that one of our most dedicated volunteer leaders, alumnus Jean Mullan, has agreed to serve as chair of our Campaign Cabinet," Sheehy said.

In her role as chair, Mullan chose to make her leadership gift to support outstanding faculty by establishing the college's

first endowed position-the Jean Mullan Professorship in Literacy. Mullan is a 1968 graduate of the college's elementary education program and was a classroom OF

teacher. Her decision to support the work of the Maryland Literacy Research Center is a natural outgrowth of her advocacy for children.

The gift is the capstone that will allow the college to retain and recruit the best faculty in literacy to direct the work of the Maryland Literacy Research Center, Kivlighan said.

The first recipient of The Jean Mullan Professorship in Literacy is John T. Guthrie, Ph.D., director of the Maryland Literacy Research Center and a professor in the Department of Human Development. (See related story in this issue of Endeavors.)

generous \$500,000 gift by Jean Mullan, a College of Education alumnus ('68) and chair of the college's Campaign Cabinet. The fund provides significant support each year for an esteemed scholar to conduct literacy-related research to improve education throughout all grades in American schools.

Professor John T. Guthrie, Ph.D., is the inaugural Jean Mullan Professor of Literacy. An endowed professorship is one of the highest honors a college can bestow, and is reserved for an eminent scholar whose work substantially advances the discipline.

"A gift like this supports the College of Education's goal to retain great faculty and attract outstanding graduate students who want to conduct research with a remarkable scholar like Dr. Guthrie," said Interim Dean, Dennis M. Kivlighan, Jr.

Guthrie, a professor in the Department of Human Development, is director of the Maryland Literacy Research Center at the University of Maryland. His research emphasizes children's motivation for reading. Guthrie is a recipient of the Oscar Causey Award for Outstanding Reading Research, a member of the International Reading Association Hall of Fame, and the 2004 recipient of the University System of Maryland's Regents Award for research/scholarship/creative activity.

"To be named the Jean Mullan Professor in Literacy is extremely special, it is a real culmination and recognition of the research I've done with many outstanding colleagues," Guthrie

said."I recognize the power of this gift-research into reading and literacy is my way to advance the cause to help others, especially children."

As a former classroom educator, civic volunteer, and mother, Mullan is passionate in her conviction that support for the college has a lasting and positive impact on the lives of children."My investment in the College of Education and its faculty is anchored in my belief that education truly transforms lives and opens many doors for kids," Mullan said. "I understand from firsthand experience the value of literacy, especially in young children. My hope is that my gift will help the college to remain at the forefront in research that addresses motivation and engagement in reading and that many generations of students will benefit from the good work of Dr. Guthrie and his colleagues."

Mullan is the former president of the College of Education's Alumni Chapter Board of Directors. In her current leadership position as chair of the College of Education Campaign Cabinet she works with a volunteer group of alumni and friends to increase understanding and awareness of the value of investing

in the college. The University's senior vice president and Provost, William Destler, recognized the establishment of the endowed professorship and Guthrie's appointment at a special luncheon on Nov. 3.

The gift from Mullan is among several significant donations to the college in support of the "Great Expectations" campaign. The philanthropic investments will provide funding for student scholarships, recruiting and retaining top faculty, enhancing physical facilities and library and technology resources, and reinforcing excellence and innovation in academic programs. This support will help make the University of Maryland a truly great research university; an institution with global reach and impact.

Outstanding Leader

Charlene Cooper Boston has over 40 years experience in the field of education and is currently Interim Chief Executive Officer of the Baltimore County Public Schools System. She has the distinction of being the first African-American superintendent of the Wicomico County Public Schools and the first African-American woman public school superintendent on Maryland's Eastern Shore. Her accomplishments in these roles had a positive impact on student achievement, with student performances on many measures exceeding national and state averages. Boston has received numerous recognitions for her work, including being selected this year as a member of the District Leaders for Citizenship and Service Learning by the Education Commission of the States National Center for Learning and Citizenship. Outstanding Leader

Jon M. Andes has demonstrated outstanding leadership throughout his career spanning the last 32 years. During his tenure as Assistant Principal and Principal of Havre De Grace High School, the school was named a National School of Excellence in 1990. In 1991, he was appointed Assistant Superintendent in Personnel in Harford County Public Schools. After naming Andes Superintendent of Worcester County Public Schools in 1996, the System accrued a long list of accomplishments, including consistently high test scores and the recognition of three National Blue Ribbon Schools and six Maryland Blue Ribbon Schools. Andes was named Maryland Superintendent of the Year (2001), and honored with the Maryland Minority Achievement Award (2004) and the National Distinguished Eagle Scout Award. Outstanding Professional Educator

Jean E. Lokerson became known as a strong advocate for improving the education of individuals with disabilities during her 26-year career as a teacher educator. Considered a pioneer in helping educators, employers, and parents understand and address the challenges of a disability, she developed a unique Teacher Educator Team stipend program and worked to strengthen certification standards. Now an Associate Professor Emerita at Virginia Commonwealth University, Lokerson also shares her experience in various leadership roles for several influential organizations, including the Council for Exceptional Children, the Learning Disabilities Association, and the U.S. Department of Education. Outstanding Professional Educator

Larry D. Roper has over 31 years of experience in college student affairs administration. Currently Vice Provost for Student Affairs and Professor of Ethnic Studies at Oregon State University, he is highly regarded as a visionary leader, a skillful collaborator, and the epitome of a scientist-practitioner. Roper was Vice President and Dean of Students at St. John Fisher College and Beaver College. He served as editor of the *Journal of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators*, as chair of the student affairs council of the National Association of State University and Land Grant Colleges, and as a commissioner with the National Commission on College and Universities. He is a former board member of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Foundation. In 2006, he was recognized by NASPA as Outstanding Dean in the United States. (*Ph.D. ~ College Student Personnel Administration, '88*)

Dean's Award for Outstanding Professional Achievement

Anthony G. Marchione recently retired as Superintendent of Schools after holding leadership positions in the Baltimore County Public Schools System for over 40 years. Throughout his tenure, he focused the school system on three goals—improving achievement for all students, maintaining a safe and orderly learning environment, and using resources effectively and efficiently. For approximately 20 years, Marchione taught leadership courses at the University of Maryland, Loyola College, and Morgan State University. He also designed the course entitled, "Educational Leadership in Baltimore County," which was required of all supervisors and principals, and later established a formal performance review and appraisal process for administrative and supervisory personnel. Since his retirement, Marchione has assumed the role of Administrative Officer, providing leadership to 25 departments of the Baltimore County government. (*Ph.D. ~ Education Administration, '72; M.Ed., '59*)

Outstanding New Professional

Scott Jackson Dantley is the new Dean of the College of Education and Professor of Science Education at Florida A&M University. Prior to this he was Acting Dean of the School of Education at Bowie State University. He participated in several accreditation activities for Middle States and the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), and reviewed for the National Science Foundation (NSF) and the U.S. Department of Education. He is a member of AERA, NARST, AACTE and RAMP and lends his expertise to various advisory and editorial boards. Most recently, he was selected as a member of the Board of Examiners for NCATE. A well-published scholar and presenter, Dantley is currently co-principal investigator on two major grants totaling over \$2 million through the NSF and National Institutes of Health. (Ph.D., '99; M.Ed., '98 ~ Curriculum and Instruction-Science Education)

Outstanding Scholar

Richard A. Duschl is a Professor of Science Education at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. A significant contributor in his field, his work has led to several new ideas regarding how formative assessment strategies can help learners and teachers make scientific thinking visible. His scholarship has been published in several journals on inquiry science teaching, learning, cognition, and assessment, and received funding support through a number of grants from the National Science Foundation, Duschl is former chair of Science Education at King's College London and editor emeritus of *Science Education* journal. He was a member of the NRC committee that authored the Inquiry Addendum for the National Science Education Standards and currently chairs the National Academies study committee, "Science Learning-Kindergarten through Eighth Grade." (*Ph.D. ~ Curriculum and Instruction-Science Education, '83; B.S. ~ Earth Science Education, '74*)

Outstanding New Scholar

Stacey S. Horn is an Associate Professor of Educational Psychology at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC). Her groundbreaking research on group exclusion and peer harassment in adolescence has been cited in textbooks and published in notable journals like the International Journal of Behavioral Development, the Journal of Youth and Adolescence, and Equity and Excellence in Education. Horn instructs pre-and in-service teachers at UIC about adolescent development, and is President of the governing board for the Coalition for Education on Sexual Orientation—a statewide coalition working to ensure all schools are safe for all students regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. Her work has received grant support from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, the Wayne F. Placek Foundation of the American Psychological Foundation, and various other private foundations. (Ph.D. ~ Human Development, '00)

Outstanding New Scholar

Chris L. Rasmussen is an Associate Professor in the Department of Mathematics and Statistics at San Diego State University. He has focused his work on using differential equations as a prototype to investigate how approaches that have been successful at promoting student learning in earlier grade levels can be adapted to the university setting. A recipient of the prestigious Early Career Award (1988) from the National Science Foundation, he has authored student material for a first course in differential equations and is co-editor of a forthcoming book focusing on connecting research and practice in undergraduate mathematics education. His work has been published in various publications, including the Journal of Mathematical Behavior. Rasmussen has also earned high commendations for his work promoting the discipline in his role as Coordinator for the Special Interest Group of the Mathematical Association of America on Research in Undergraduate Mathematics Education (SIGMAA-RUME). (*Ph.D. ~ Mathematics Education, '97; M.A. ~ Mathematics, '94; B.S. ~ Mechanical Engineering, '85*)

Outstanding Professional

Carl Bryant is General Manager of Personnel Decisions International's Washington, D.C. office. He is responsible for leading the company's development activities across the mid-Atlantic region. Bryant brings a wealth of experience to this post, having served as an officer in the U.S. Air Force, director of the U.S. Air Force Cadet Counseling Center, professor of Managerial Development at the Defense Systems Management College, and vice president for Knowledge Management and Applied Technology at the Center for Creative Leadership. An expert coach and instructor, he has taught leadership classes worldwide and was a featured speaker at the 2003 United Nations Leadership Conference in Istanbul, Turkey. Bryant is also an accomplished researcher and published author. He also held a supervisory role in the creation of a new refereed journal focusing on the development of better program managers. (*Ph.D.* ~ *Counseling and Personnel Services, '84*)

Alumni Teacher of the Year

Lisa Bender is a 19-year veteran teacher of economics and marketing classes at Southern Garrett High School. Her classroom financial literacy initiatives won honors and recognition from the Maryland Banker's Association, her students won the statewide stock market game sponsored by the Maryland Council on Economic Education on four occasions, and she won the state investment competition twice. Bender's Entrepreneurial Heritage Project, which partners business students with local entrepreneurs, led to a nomination by her principal for a national Leavey award from the Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge. Phi Delta Kappa Outstanding Mentor Teacher

Patricia Donofrio was honored by Phi Delta Kappa for her many years dedicated to uplifting the lives of students through mentorship. Donofrio graduated from St. Joseph's College in Brooklyn, N.Y. with a B.A. in Child Study and a minor in Sociology. She earned a Master of Science in Education from Brooklyn College, then continued her studies at San Jose State College in San Jose, Ca. and Trinity College in Washington D.C., becoming certified as a reading teacher. Donofrio's inspiring career spans almost four decades. She is in her 17th year as a first-grade teacher at Kenilworth Elementary School in Bowie, Md. Among her many roles at Kenilworth, she is co-chair of the School Based Management Team, Grade Level Chair, and PTA liaison. She has also been actively involved with the University of Maryland mentoring program for over a decade.

Outstanding Scholar

Richard Earl Hardy served over 25 years as Chairman and then Professor Emeritus of the Department of Rehabilitation Counseling at the Medical College of Virginia until his retirement in 1996. He is also co-owner and chief clinical psychologist for the Richmond Headache Center. Widely recognized as an influential force in his field, Hardy held various government and professional appointments with organizations like the American Association for Counseling and Development, the American Psychological Association, and the National Rehabilitation Association. Institute at this point has many opportunities to develop infrastructure to enable its pursuit of research grants, creative outreach programs and activities, and to impact both policy and practice in K-12 schools. "Dr. Brown will have a major influence in the continued development of the Institute and we welcome her aboard."

Brown says the focus of her efforts is policies and services that impact children from lowincome families. "As a team, we will cooperatively work with school district administrators, university faculty and staff, state administrators, and community leaders to reduce the minority achievement gap," said Brown. "Most importantly, it is my expectation the Institute's efforts will improve the academic performance of minority students throughout Maryland and make significant contributions to the national discourse."




