



## Martin Luther King, Jr. / Day of Service Teacher Resource Guide

Martin Luther King Day is the only federal holiday specifically tied to calling on people to volunteer to improve their community. “The Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service is a defining moment each year when Americans across the country step up to make our communities more equitable and take action to create the Beloved Community of Dr. King’s dream. While Dr. King believed the Beloved Community was possible, he acknowledged and fought for systemic change. His example is our call to action.” ([AmeriCorps](#))

The resources listed below are designed to help educators create lessons about Dr. King, his legacy, and his call to service that can be incorporated into the curriculum throughout the year. The second section of resources is designed to help teachers support their students participating in service.

### Teaching About Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Civil Rights

<a href="#">Learning for Justice</a>	PK-12	<p>Helpful <a href="#">“Do’s and Don’ts” for teaching about MLK</a> throughout the year organized around three parts of the school: displays, curriculum and discussions.</p> <p><a href="#">Lesson plans for grades K-12</a> includes information about voting rights and other topics central to the Civil Rights Movement and ongoing social justice issues.</p> <p><a href="#">Ideas for how to approach</a> the day with your students and wider school community.</p>
<a href="#">King Institute at Stanford University</a>	PK-20	<p>Numerous resources for students of all age groups.</p> <p>For <a href="#">younger students</a>, there are book recommendations and animation to go along with the audio of Dr. King giving his famous “I Have a Dream” speech.</p> <p>College, and perhaps high school students, might find the <a href="#">research section</a> of the website helpful, with access to much of King’s work. The website also includes a resource page for <a href="#">students</a> and <a href="#">teachers</a>.</p>

<a href="#">New York Times Resource List</a>	Any	Although not full lesson plans, this site provides six ideas and corresponding background information for teaching about Dr. King. In addition to more traditional lesson ideas, this site includes resources to teach about Black Lives Matter and protests as a part of MLK Day lessons.
<a href="#">National Park Service</a>	PK-12	An overview of Dr King’s life and the Civil Rights Movement, background about the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial in Washington, DC, and links to several other key historic sites. This could be excellent source material for a virtual field trip.
<a href="#">Teach For America - One Day</a>	PK-12	Includes both teaching resources and service opportunities. Teaching resources focus on the King family’s call to focus on voting rights. The site also has a link to King’s lesser known speeches and to book recommendations about Dr. King.
<a href="#">Smithsonian Magazine</a>	PK-12	In this article, three museum educators write about how to “expand upon what traditional textbooks and mainstream media might share about King to build a more contextualized, nuanced understanding” of the man and his contributions. Find links to primary source materials including art, photographs, speeches, and a learning laboratory.
<a href="#">American Association of State Colleges and Universities</a>	Higher education	This resource explains the federal holiday and why it is linked to service and has the motto “make it a day on not a day off”. It also links to numerous national organizations that support MLK Day Activities, including AmeriCorps and the King Center as well as numerous calls to action for college and university students.
