Preparing Educators to Work with Learners from Diverse Backgrounds

Several of our degree and certificate programs provide additional learning opportunities for current educators who want to gain specialized training to work with multilingual students, immigrant students and students with learning differences, including the following

- The first of its kind in the state, our Ed.D. in School System Leadership-Specialization in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) and Dual Language Education bridges the fields of language education and school leadership and prepares teachers and school/district-level administrators to address the academic, cultural and language needs of multilingual learners. The program culminates in capstone projects (as opposed to traditional dissertations) that are intended to be implemented following graduation. The Post-Baccalaureate Certificate (PBC) in TESOL introduces non-ESOL teachers to foundational knowledge and practices that address multilingual learners' needs within their disciplines. This program also prepares teachers to take the ESOL Praxis for their add-on endorsement in ESOL from the Maryland State Department of Education.
- The PBC in Dual Language Education prepares teachers to work with multilingual learners across content areas, specifically in one- and two-way immersion environments.

- The Post-Master's Certificate in Supporting Immigrant Students for Professional School Counselors equips counselors with specialized skills to work with students of families who have recently immigrated to the United States, specifically focusing on addressing needs related to trauma, post-traumatic stress, culture shock and poverty. In addition, counselors learn about promoting students' health, well-being, English language acquisition, acculturation, academic achievement and socioemotional growth and development.
- The M.Ed. in Special Education with a focus on Early Childhood (Birth-5) and M.Ed. in Special Education- Autism Spectrum Disorders are designed for professionals who are already certified and want to specialize in special education.
- The Graduate Certificate in Special Education for General Education Teachers in Inclusive Classrooms prepares educators to meet the needs of students with disabilities in inclusive classroom settings.
- In partnership with the Center for Innovation and Leadership at the Kennedy Krieger Institute, the Certificate in Supporting Children with Intensive Behavior Needs prepares educators to meet the needs of students with intensive behavior needs within various K-12 settings.

Academic Centers to Support the Education of Diverse Learners

- Committed to promoting research and outreach related to multilingualism, multilingual communities and the education of multilingual populations, the Multilingual Research Center works to increase the quality and number of TESOL, World Language and dual language programs and teachers in Maryland and beyond.
- The Center for Transition and **Career Innovation** (CTCI) is designed to explore issues related to school-to-work transition for youth with disabilities. CTCI conducts usable research and offers best practices and targeted technical assistance for scholars, policymaker and practitioners. The center also offers a range of professional development opportunities through research symposia, institutes, courses, workshops and consultation. The **Institute for the Study** of Exceptional Children and Youth is a research, development and service organization that addresses a broad array of issues in special education.
- The Center for Mathematics Education is a nationally prominent research and teaching center that addresses the improvement of mathematics education in K-16. The center's innovative teacher preparation programs and focused outreach efforts to local schools help increase access and participation of underrepresented minorities in mathematics.
- The Maryland Institute for Minority Achievement and Urban Education is an action-oriented collaborative focused on improving minority achievement, eliminating the achievement gap and transforming urban education. One of its most widely known projects, Mathletics, immerses middle school students in a year-long program designed to engage them in data analytics through sports.
