#### **Register to vote in Maryland\***

Maryland voters need to register, confirm, or update your address and other info by October 15, 2024. If you are a new Maryland voter, you can also do "same day registration" when you vote in person during Early Voting or on Election Day.

# If you are not eligible to vote, there are still plenty of ways to be engaged in the election!

- Identify three friends / peers / family members who are eligible to vote and
  - o encourage them to: register to vote, make a plan for voting, research the candidates and issues on the ballot
  - o remind them to vote on Election Day .
- Identify a candidate whose views you share and help with their campaign.
- Pick a group working on issues you care about and support their "Get Out the Vote" efforts.
- Learn about the candidates and ballot questions and share information with others.

#### **Be an Election Judge**

Get paid to help your community vote at the polls.

Election judges (also known as poll workers) are a critical part of running elections and ensuring they are free and fair!

- \$250 \$325 per day
- \$50 for training (you must work your assigned shift to be paid for training)

You can serve as an election judge if you are:

- Registered to vote in Maryland
- Age 16 or older\*; (If you are 16 or older, you may be able to serve if you show your local board of
  elections that you are qualified to be an election judge and a parent or guardian gives
  permission.)
- Physically and mentally able to work at least a full **15-hour day**; (You must be able to sit and/or stand for an extended period and you may be required to lift boxes and other items weighing 10-25 pounds.)
- Willing to work outside your home precinct
- Can speak, read, and write English
