School Counseling Alumni Train Next Generation of School Counselors

Esme Pierzchala, UMD Class of '21, has been an elementary school counselor at Tulip Grove Elementary School since interning there in the Spring of her final year in the program. She is now supervising Meghan McLees, a current second year student. Esme shared how as a first year supervisor she has been able to model a collaborative supervisor-supervisee relationship.

Before she started on her masters journey, Esme worked with an Americorp program in D.C where she managed young adult Americorp members. Through this position, she found a love for mentoring not just K-12 students but also the next generation of educators working with this population. As she developed her school counselor identity at UMD, part of her purpose fostered into supporting the next generation of school counselors. Her previous school counseling supervisors have been a great model into the expectations of the role as well as how she can eventually evolve as a school counseling supervisor.



Esme has no exact formula in dividing up the work between the two counselors and instead follows the needs of her intern. The first thing she did to understand her new intern was to open the conversation around goals. By starting this relationship with open communication, Esme learned what her intern has practiced in the past and what she wants to further develop as a professional school counselor. "We keep the open lines of communication consistent by at least having weekly supervision meetings to go over the goals for the week, what the supervisor needs from the intern, what the intern needs to get accomplished, and depending on what was worked on the week prior, and identify areas of growth" Esme said.

When Esme is doing the indirect services of the program, Meghan is balancing it with the direct services, working together to build up the school counseling program at Tulip Grove Elementary. Esme stated "Interns are not going to learn everything there is to be, but give them the general overview of the profession. And then for interns, it is to take risks, your site is a place to learn and make mistakes. This is a chance for school counselors to grow and present yourself as a school counselor you want to be one day."
